Mediation Workshop in Art and Cultural Heritage

New York, Thursday and Friday, 7 - 8 February 2013

This Workshop provides a two-day Mediation training on the new Art and Cultural Heritage Mediation Program developed by the International Council of Museums (ICOM) and the World Intellectual Property Organization (WIPO) Arbitration and Mediation Center. How can conflicts in art and cultural heritage be resolved through mediation? How does the mediator position himself as a neutral, independent and impartial intermediary between the parties? What are the specific mediation techniques in art and cultural heritage disputes? How does the mediator help the parties reach an acceptable and satisfactory agreement?

Themes

- Disputes relating to art and cultural heritage: return and restitution, loan and deposit, acquisition, intellectual property, etc.
- Parties: States, local governments, museums, individuals, indigenous communities, etc.
- ICOM-WIPO Mediation Rules
- Mediator's expertise, impartiality and independence
- Mediator's role, techniques and methods
- ICOM Code of Ethics for Museums
- Mediation meetings
- Exploring the interests of the parties
- Conclusion of the mediation
- Drafting of mediation contract clauses and submission agreements
- Other alternative dispute resolution procedures

Who Should Attend?

Art and cultural heritage experts, museum professionals, local communities, government officials, permanent delegations, auctions houses, art galleries, and other art sector stakeholders.

Participants will be expected to have a basic understanding and experience of cultural and intellectual property issues that may arise in disputes referred to ICOM-WIPO Mediation. Proficiency in English is essential for participation.

Overview

The Mediation Workshop in Art and Cultural Heritage is an intensive training course in the techniques of mediation, emphasizing effective communication and increased understanding.

The Workshop will include a general presentation of the ICOM-WIPO Mediation model, as well as interactive sessions about the different steps in mediation and the mediator's techniques. A case scenario on cultural heritage and intellectual property issues will provide the basics for simulated mediation acted in small groups of participants.
