Introduction

After more than two years of experience of IPC reform, the Committee of Experts of the IPC Union, at its fortieth session, established a Task Force for evaluating the modifications introduced under the reform of the IPC. This Task Force also included representatives of offices using the core level for classifying their national patent publications. The documents related to the discussions and conclusions of the Task Force at its meeting on September 10 and 11, 2008, are available on the IPC e-forum (<http://www.wipo.int/ipc-ief>) in projects CE 404 and CE 405.

Following the recommendations of the Task Force, the Committee agreed on certain simplifications of the structure and the revision procedure of the IPC. The decisions of the Committee are reflected in the report of its forty-first session (see document IPC/CE/41/6, and in particular, its Annex 3) that can be found on the WIPO IPC website at the following address: [http://www.wipo.int/meetings/en/details.jsp?meeting\\_id=17524](http://www.wipo.int/meetings/en/details.jsp?meeting_id=17524).

One major change that was adopted is the abolition of the two levels (core and advanced) of the IPC as separate and individually published parts of the Classification, with different publication dates and revised by different bodies. For example, several entries have titles and notes that are different in the two levels. After January 1, 2011, only one single publication of the IPC will be maintained. The current option of classifying national patent applications by using the core level will be replaced by the option of classifying by using main groups only.

As the hierarchical structure of the main groups is much simpler than the current core level structure, which additionally includes subgroups of different hierarchical depths, the use of the IPC will become even easier for offices with limited classification resources and small patent collections.
