

ADMINISTRATIVE PANEL DECISION

QlikTech International AB v. zhou kun

Case No. D2026-2298

1. The Parties

Complainant is QlikTech International AB, Sweden, represented by Abion AB, Sweden.

Respondent is zhou kun, China.

2. The Domain Name and Registrar

The disputed domain name <qliksensemobile.com> (the “Domain Name”) is registered with Gname.com Pte. Ltd. (the “Registrar”).

3. Procedural History

The Complaint was filed in English with the WIPO Arbitration and Mediation Center (the “Center”) on May 28, 2026. On May 28, 2026, the Center transmitted by email to the Registrar a request for registrar verification in connection with the Domain Name. On May 29, 2026, the Registrar transmitted by email to the Center its verification response disclosing registrant and contact information for the Domain Name which differed from the named Respondent (Redacted for privacy) and contact information in the Complaint. The Center sent an email communication to Complainant on June 2, 2026, providing the registrant and contact information disclosed by the Registrar, and inviting Complainant to submit an amendment to the Complaint. Complainant filed an amended Complaint in English on June 3, 2026.

On June 2, 2026, the Center informed the Parties in Chinese and English, that the language of the Registration Agreement for the Domain Name is Chinese. On June 3, 2026, Complainant requested English to be the language of the proceeding. Respondent did not submit any comment on Complainant’s submission.

The Center verified that the Complaint together with the amended Complaint satisfied the formal requirements of the Uniform Domain Name Dispute Resolution Policy (the “Policy” or “UDRP”), the Rules for Uniform Domain Name Dispute Resolution Policy (the “Rules”), and the WIPO Supplemental Rules for Uniform Domain Name Dispute Resolution Policy (the “Supplemental Rules”).

In accordance with the Rules, paragraphs 2 and 4, the Center formally notified Respondent in Chinese and English of the Complaint, and the proceedings commenced on June 4, 2026. In accordance with the Rules,

paragraph 5, the due date for Response was June 24, 2026. Respondent did not submit any response. Accordingly, the Center notified Respondent's default on June 29, 2026.

The Center appointed Kimberley Chen Nobles as the sole panelist in this matter on July 3, 2026. The Panel finds that it was properly constituted. The Panel has submitted the Statement of Acceptance and Declaration of Impartiality and Independence, as required by the Center to ensure compliance with the Rules, paragraph 7.

4. Factual Background

Founded in 1993, Complainant forms part of the QlikTech Group, which offers software to business worldwide and serves over 40,000 global customers with over 235,000 community members. One of the products offered by the QlikTech Group is Qlik Sense. Qlik Sense is a data analytics and data visualization platform developed by Complainant and launched in 2014. According to Complainant, Qlik Sense enables users to connect and combine data from hundreds of data sources, including databases, applications, cloud services, spreadsheets, and web-based data, in order to facilitate interactive analysis, visualization, and discovery of information.

Complainant owns several registered trademark registrations for the QLIK and QLIK SENSE marks in various jurisdictions, including:

- International trademark registration number 839118 for the QLIK word mark, registered on May 14, 2004, designating China;
- European Union trademark registration number 001115948 for the QLIK word mark, registered on May 16, 2000;
- United States of America trademark registration number 3114427 for the QLIK word mark, registered on July 11, 2006;
- International trademark registration number 1236345 for the QLIK SENSE word mark, registered on November 6, 2014; and
- European Union trademark registration number 012889481 for the QLIK SENSE word mark, registered on October 2, 2014.

Complainant also owns and operates the domain names <qliksense.com> and <qliksense.cn>, created in 2014, which resolve to Complainant's official website, where Complainant provides information regarding its products and services, including Qlik Sense, Qlik Sense Mobile, and related analytics and business intelligence solutions.

The Domain Name was registered on January 29, 2026 and resolves to a website offering online gambling and betting services.

On May 6, 2026, Complainant sent a Cease-and-Desist Letter to Respondent, through the contact form as provided by the Registrar, and to the Registrar abuse contact asking the latter to forward the letter to Respondent. Several reminders were also sent, but no response was received.

5. Parties' Contentions

A. Complainant

Complainant contends that it has satisfied each of the elements required under the Policy for a transfer of the Domain Name.

Complainant contends that (i) the Domain Name is identical or confusingly similar to Complainant's trademarks; (ii) Respondent has no rights or legitimate interests in the Domain Name; and (iii) Respondent registered and is using the Domain Name in bad faith.

In particular, Complainant contends that it has trademark registrations for QLIK and QLIK SENSE, and that Respondent registered and is using the Domain Name with the intention to confuse Internet users looking for bona fide and well-known QLIK and QLIK SENSE products and services.

Complainant notes that it has no affiliation with Respondent, and that Respondent is using the Domain Name as a tool to exploit Complainant's reputation for its own commercial gain, and that Respondent has no rights or legitimate interests in the registration and use of the Domain Name. Further, Complainant contends that Respondent has acted in bad faith in acquiring and setting up the Domain Name, when Respondent clearly knew of Complainant's rights.

B. Respondent

Respondent did not reply to Complainant's contentions.

6. Discussion and Findings

6.1. Preliminary Issue: Language of the Proceedings

The Rules, in paragraph 11(a), provide that unless otherwise agreed by the parties or specified otherwise in the registration agreement between the respondent and the registrar in relation to the disputed domain name, the language of the proceedings shall be the language of the registration agreement, subject to the authority of the panel to determine otherwise, having regard to the circumstances of the administrative proceedings.

Complainant submitted its original Complaint in English. In its Complaint and amended Complaint, Complainant submitted its request that the language of the proceedings should be English. According to the information received from the Registrar, the language of the Registration Agreement for the Domain Name is Chinese. Respondent did not submit any comment on Complainant's submission.

Complainant submits that it would be burdensome, costly, and result in delay, if Complainant is required to translate the Complaint into Chinese; that the Domain Name is composed of Latin characters and incorporates English terms; that the Domain Name fully incorporates Complainant's QLIK and QLIK SENSE trademarks followed by the terms "sense" and "mobile" (in the case of Complainant's QLIK trademark) and the term "mobile" (in the case of Complainant's QLIK SENSE trademark), which are common English terms; and the website to which the Domain Name resolves hosts content in English.

In exercising its discretion to use a language other than that of the Registration Agreement for the Domain Name, the Panel has to exercise such discretion judicially in the spirit of fairness and justice to both Parties, taking into account all relevant circumstances of the case, including matters such as the Parties' ability to understand and use the proposed language, time, and costs.

The Panel accepts Complainant's submissions regarding the language of the proceedings. The Panel also notes that the Domain Name does not have any specific meaning in the Chinese language, and that the Domain Name is formed using Latin characters, and contains Complainant's QLIK and QLIK SENSE trademarks in their entirety. The Panel further notes that the Center notified the Parties in Chinese and English of the language of the proceedings as well as notified Respondent in Chinese and English of the Complaint. Respondent chose not to comment on the language of the proceedings, nor did Respondent choose to file a Response in Chinese or English.

The Panel further notes that Complainant had previously sent a cease-and-desist letter to Respondent and while Respondent had ample time and opportunity to respond and request that communications continue in Chinese, Respondent neither issued such a request nor responded to Complainant; and that under paragraph 11(a) of the Rules, the Panel may determine the language of the proceedings having taken into consideration the totality of the circumstances.

Having considered all the circumstances of this case, the Panel determines that English be the language of the proceedings.

6.2. Substantive Issues

Under paragraph 4(a) of the Policy, to succeed Complainant must satisfy the Panel that:

- (i) the Domain Name is identical or confusingly similar to a trademark or service mark in which Complainant has rights;
- (ii) Respondent has no rights or legitimate interests in respect of the Domain Name; and
- (iii) the Domain Name was registered and is being used in bad faith.

Section 4.3 of WIPO Overview of WIPO Panel Views on Select UDRP Questions ("[WIPO Overview 3.1](#)") states that failure to respond to the complainant's contentions would not by itself mean that the complainant is deemed to have prevailed; a respondent's default is not necessarily an admission that the complainant's claims are true.

Thus, although in this case, Respondent has failed to formally respond to the Complaint, the burden remains with Complainant to establish the three elements of paragraph 4(a) of the Policy by a preponderance of the evidence.

A. Identical or Confusingly Similar

Ownership of a trademark registration is generally sufficient evidence that a complainant has the requisite rights in a mark for purposes of paragraph 4(a)(i) of the Policy. See [WIPO Overview 3.1](#), section 1.2.1. Complainant has provided evidence of its rights in the QLIK and QLIK SENSE trademarks, as noted above under section 4. Complainant has therefore proven that it has the requisite rights in the QLIK and QLIK SENSE trademarks.

With Complainant's rights in the QLIK and QLIK SENSE trademarks established, the remaining question under the first element of the Policy is whether the Domain Name, typically disregarding the Top-Level Domain ("TLD") in which it is registered (in this case, ".com"), is identical or confusingly similar to Complainant's trademark. See, e.g., *B & H Foto & Electronics Corp. v. Domains by Proxy, Inc. / Joseph Gross*, WIPO Case No. [D2010-0842](#).

Here, the Domain Name is confusingly similar to Complainant's QLIK and QLIK SENSE trademarks. The QLIK and QLIK SENSE trademark are recognizable in the Domain Name. In particular, the Domain Name's inclusion of Complainant's QLIK and QLIK SENSE trademark in its entirety, with the addition of the terms "sense" and "mobile" (in the case of Complainant's QLIK trademark) and the term "mobile" (in the case of Complainant's QLIK SENSE trademark), which does not prevent a finding of confusing similarity between the Domain Name and the QLIK and QLIK SENSE trademark. See section 1.8 of the [WIPO Overview 3.1](#).

Thus, the Panel finds that Complainant has satisfied the first element of the Policy.

B. Rights or Legitimate Interests

Under paragraph 4(a)(ii) of the Policy, a complainant must make a prima facie showing that a respondent possesses no rights or legitimate interests in a disputed domain name. See, e.g., *Malayan Banking Berhad v. Beauty, Success & Truth International*, WIPO Case No. [D2008-1393](#). Once a complainant makes out such a prima facie showing, the burden of production shifts to the respondent, though the burden of proof always remains on the complainant. If the respondent fails to come forward with relevant evidence showing rights or legitimate interests, the complainant will have sustained its burden under the second element of the UDRP.

From the record in this case, it is evident that Respondent was, and is, aware of Complainant and its QLIK and QLIK SENSE trademarks, and does not have any rights or legitimate interests in the Domain Name. In addition, Complainant asserts that Respondent is not authorized to promote Complainant's services and is not related to Complainant. Respondent is also not known to be associated with the QLIK and QLIK SENSE trademarks and there is no evidence showing that Respondent has been commonly known by the Domain Name.

In addition, Respondent has not used the Domain Name in connection with a bona fide offering of goods or services or a legitimate noncommercial or fair use. Rather, at the time of the filing of the Complaint, the Domain Name resolved to a page that promotes online gambling services and features links to third-party online gambling websites.

Such use by Respondent does not constitute a bona fide offering of goods or services or a legitimate noncommercial or fair use and cannot under the circumstances confer on Respondent any rights or legitimate interests in the Domain Name.

Moreover, the nature of the Domain Name, incorporating the entirety of Complainant's trademarks QLIK and QLIK SENSE with the term "mobile" – which is a term Complainant uses on its platform to grow and expand its mobile business, cannot be considered fair use as it may suggest an affiliation with Complainant that does not exist. See [WIPO Overview 3.1](#), section 2.5.1.

Accordingly, Complainant has provided evidence supporting its prima facie claim that Respondent lacks any rights or legitimate interests in the Domain Name. Respondent has failed to produce countervailing evidence of any rights or legitimate interests in the Domain Name.

Thus, the Panel concludes that Respondent does not have any rights or legitimate interests in the Domain Name, and Complainant has met its burden under paragraph 4(a)(ii) of the Policy.

C. Registered and Used in Bad Faith

The Panel finds that Respondent's actions indicate that Respondent registered and is using the Domain Name in bad faith.

Paragraph 4(b) of the Policy provides a non-exhaustive list of circumstances indicating bad faith registration and use on the part of a domain name registrant, namely:

"(i) circumstances indicating that you have registered or you have acquired the domain name primarily for the purpose of selling, renting, or otherwise transferring the domain name registration to the complainant who is the owner of the trademark or service mark or to a competitor of that complainant, for valuable consideration in excess of your documented out-of-pocket costs directly related to the domain name; or

(ii) you have registered the domain name in order to prevent the owner of the trademark or service mark from reflecting the mark in a corresponding domain name, provided that you have engaged in a pattern of such conduct; or

(iii) you have registered the domain name primarily for the purpose of disrupting the business of a competitor; or

(iv) by using the domain name, you have intentionally attempted to attract, for commercial gain, Internet users to your website or other online location, by creating a likelihood of confusion with the complainant's mark as to the source, sponsorship, affiliation, or endorsement of your website or location or of a product or service on your website or location."

The Panel finds that Complainant has provided ample evidence to show that registration and use of the QLIK and QLIK SENSE trademarks long predate the registration of the Domain Name. Complainant is also well established and known. Indeed, the record shows that Complainant's QLIK and QLIK SENSE trademarks and related products and services are widely known and recognized. Therefore, the Panel is of the view that Respondent was aware of the QLIK and QLIK SENSE trademarks when it registered the Domain Name. See [WIPO Overview 3.1](#), section 3.2.2; see also *TTT Moneycorp Limited v. Privacy Gods / Privacy Gods Limited*, WIPO Case No. [D2016-1973](#).

The Panel therefore finds that Respondent's awareness of Complainant's trademark rights at the time of registration suggests bad faith. See *Red Bull GmbH v. Credit du Léman SA, Jean-Denis Deletraz*, WIPO Case No. [D2011-2209](#); *Nintendo of America Inc v. Marco Beijen, Beijen Consulting, Pokemon Fan Clubs Org., and Pokemon Fans Unite*, WIPO Case No. [D2001-1070](#); and *BellSouth Intellectual Property Corporation v. Serena, Axel*, WIPO Case No. [D2006-0007](#).

Further, the registration of the Domain Name similar to Complainant's QLIK and QLIK SENSE trademarks and official domain names <qliksense.com> and <qliksense.cn> suggests Respondent's actual knowledge of Complainant's rights in the QLIK and QLIK SENSE trademarks at the time of registration of the Domain Name and its effort to opportunistically capitalize on the registration and use of the Domain Name.

Moreover, Respondent registered and is using the Domain Name to confuse and mislead consumers looking for bona fide and well-known QLIK and QLIK SENSE products and services of Complainant or authorized partners of Complainant.

In particular, the evidence provided by Complainant indicated that at the time of filing of the Complaint, the Domain Name resolved to a page that promotes online gambling services and features links to third-party online gambling websites. Moreover, the nature of the Domain Name, incorporating the entirety of Complainant's trademarks QLIK and QLIK SENSE with the term "mobile" – which is a term Complainant uses on its platform to grow and expand its business, cannot be considered fair use as it may suggest an affiliation with Complainant that does not exist.

The use of the QLIK and QLIK SENSE mark in the Domain Name is intended to capture Internet traffic from Internet users who are looking for Complainant's products and services. Therefore, by using the Domain Name, Respondent has intentionally attempted to attract, for commercial gain, Internet users to Respondent's website by creating a likelihood of confusion with Complainant's QLIK and QLIK SENSE marks as to the source, sponsorship, affiliation, or endorsement of Respondent's website. All these actions may result in tarnishing Complainant's reputation and goodwill in the industry.

Further, the Panel also notes the failure of Respondent to submit a Response, or to provide any evidence of actual or contemplated good-faith use.

Accordingly, the Panel finds that Respondent registered and is using the Domain Name in bad faith and Complainant succeeds under the third element of paragraph 4(a) of the Policy.

7. Decision

For the foregoing reasons, in accordance with paragraphs 4(i) of the Policy and 15 of the Rules, the Panel orders that the Domain Name <qliksensemobile.com> be transferred to Complainant.
