Attached is a marked-up copy of the annex to document PCT/TCO/V/12, submitted in response to the request that observations be forwarded to the International Bureau (WIPO) by October 15, 1975.

In each situation where the search under the Treaty would appear to be different from the search under the European Patent Convention, a solution has been proposed for consideration by the Interim Committee for Technical Cooperation. There are some areas such as unity of invention which will probably need additional clarification, either in the search guidelines or in the Administrative Instructions.

The comments noted are not intended to be modifications to the search or search report made in an application filed under the European Patent Convention. However, it is presumed that the European Patent Office will follow the Patent Cooperation Treaty searching guidelines when making a search of an intennational application as an International Searching Authority.

It is suggested that this marked-up copy, or a similar copy including comments from other member states as well, be used as the first draft of searching guidelines under the Patent Cooperation Treaty.

Such searching guidelines are viewed as being very useful for developing uniform procedures among the various International Searching Authorities.
