Virtual meeting - Thirty-Second Session. Geneva, December 7 to 10, 2020

Agenda Item No. 6 Sharing session on the patentability issues relating to artificial intelligence.

ICC acknowledges the importance of the inclusion of a sharing session on patentability issues related to artificial intelligence in the discussions of this standing committee. This SCP/32 meeting takes place after the third of the meetings of the WIPO Conversation on AI and IP, where a wide range of actors discussed this issue. ICC believes that the discussions on that forum can serve as a base for maintaining a multistakeholder conversation on issues of AI, and they highlight the importance of including a business perspective in relation to a group of technologies that is still in development. ICC believes that particular attention must be paid to the issues of definitions of AI, including discussions around distinctions between AI-Generated and AI-Assisted creation, and to questions around disclosure requirements for the protection of AI subject-matter.
